BONDAGE IN IOWA

When we look at our world, we know that we are not at peace. In our souls, we do not have rest. Apart from Christ, we are in absolute poverty; not the socio-economic status, but the state of being. A term that clearly defines what the Bible means by poverty is bondage. Being in bondage is being unable to escape from a circumstance or behavior. All of creation lives in some form of bondage and all of creation is crying to be set free.

In the Church Ambassador Network, a ministry of The FAMiLY Leader Foundation, we work to come alongside the State of Iowa to help people break free from bondage as well as to prevent others from ever falling into it. The Gospel of Jesus Christ comes with the hope filled promise of freedom, rest and peace, and is the power by which the Church of Jesus Christ has witnessed people being rescued from the deadly grips of bondage for many generations.

This booklet gives an overview of critical areas of bondage impacting lowans, counties in our state that have most felt bondage's effect, ministries that are successfully breaking bondage, and key systemic problems and solutions to address in order to break bondage in the State of lowa.



COUNTIES MOST IN BONDAGE

It is helpful to get a better snapshot into what is happening in lowa in regards to bondage. To accomplish this, we can note a per capita analysis along with just raw numbers. The per capita analysis gives an excellent insight into what is happening in lowa communities. This includes analyzing the breakdown of the family, poverty rates, child abuse, foster-care placements, food insecurity, prison admission rates, bankruptcy rates and substance abuse rates on a per capita basis for all 99 counties. These counties are the highest on a per capita basis.



The two common denominators across all 12 of these counties are:

BIBLICAL PRINCIPLES OF SHALOM

In the Church Ambassador Network, a ministry of The FAMiLY LEADER Foundation, we hold to the biblical teaching that God created the world and it was good. The world was created in perfect Shalom. Shalom is a word and concept used in Old Testament scriptures that does not translate well into English.

In English it means **good**, **rest** and **peace**.



/good/ adjective

Complete. Whole. God looked at Creation and said that it was good. It was complete. It did not need anything added or subtracted from it.

A place of quiet. Free from motion or disturbance. When something is complete, you can have a true rest in both your body and your soul. Not only can you rest from physical work, but there is also nothing weighing down your soul.

When creation is in both internal and external harmony. Where there is true rest there is peace. No hostility in the soul, the body, others, or creation. Only peace.






WHAT HAPPENED TO SHALOM?



REAL HOPE AND GENUINE COMMUNITY


Jesus Christ is the only one that can bring true transformation and restoration out of brokenness by giving an eternal hope and inviting us into the family of God and community of the Church. Through Him, the needs of the soul are met that cannot be met by services or resources. This is why the Church is crucial to the work of breaking bondage in individual lives and across communities.

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COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH

All bondage eventually ends in a spiritual death. Bondage takes way more from you than you ever imagined. Bondage ravages your relationships beginning with yourself and overflowing into others. In order to break bondage it is essential that our strategies, Church and government, take a comprehensive approach as illustrated below.



PREVENTION

Stopping potential crisis or trauma

RELIEF

temporary provision of emergency aid to reduce immediate suffering

REHABILITATION

Restore people and their communities to positive elements of their pre-crisis conditions

DEVELOPMENT

Ongoing change that moves people closer to being in right relationship with God and others.

TOGETHER FOR GOOD

Social isolation is one of the greatest risk factors for child abuse and neglect and they provide a solution by hosting children during times of parental crisis and surround families with ongoing relational support through their network of care.

works to make sure all Midwestern children have the opportunity to grow into healthy adults—educated, free from poverty, safe from abuse and violence, and engaged as members of communities and nurturing families. **The Wildwood Collective**, a new extension of Wildwood Hills Ranch, provides proven step-by-step methods, training, resources and coaching for local churches to launch sustainable ministries serving foster families, adoptive families and biological families in crisis.

THE REEL HOPE PROJECT

vision is to mobilize the faith community to step into adoption, foster care, and prevention efforts. We serve as a bridge between Church and State, partnering broadly on both sides to see an end to youth waiting for families. We believe in approaching this need from both ends of the spectrum – preventing kids from entering the system and finding families for kids awaiting adoption.
